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PROCEEDINGS OF THE EASTERN DISTRICT ASSOCIATION

Thursday Morning, September 29, 1994

The Eastern District Association of Primitive Baptists convened in its 142nd annual session with Little Cowan Church, Whitesburg, Kentucky.

In early 1912, or earlier, a group of people from Little Cowan Creek began to see their need of a Savior and a place to worship where the true Gospel of Jesus Christ was preached. We have no record before 1912, but we do know these people went by horseback or on foot to a little church on Linefork Creek, about 20 miles away. This church was called The Hurricane Gap Church of Regular Primitive Baptists, with Elder D. F. Gilley as moderator and a member. Soon many of them were saved and became members of that church, but they longed for a church near home. After much praying and trust in God with an arm from the Hurricane Gap Church, our church was organized in June 1913, and was called The Little Cowan Church of Primitive Baptists, which it has remained until today. Elder D. F. Gilley was elected moderator and Bill Banks, church clerk.

Elder Gilley served as moderator from June 14, 1913 to September 1937; J. R. Peters, assistant moderator, June 9, 1917 to March 8, 1919; Jim Maggard, assistant moderator, March 11, 1933 to June 14, 1934; Jesse Gilley, assistant moderator and moderator, May 10, 1937 to September 11, 1948; Bernard Banks, moderator, February 10, 1945 to May 19, 1988; Logan Willis, moderator, September 11, 1948 to July 9, 1949; May 10, 1952 to May 1953; J. H. Sybert, moderator, May 15, 1950 to May 10, 1952; Bert Banks, moderator, May 10, 1958 to September 9, 1987; Oscar Irvin has been our good moderator for the last six years, with associates Ray Raleigh, Brad Dutton and Woodrow Fields.

Older ministers who helped in the organizing of our church were: Elders A. N. Joyner, J. P. Peters, E. A. Robinette, F. M. Long, J. R. Peters, E. S. McPherson, Hal Lassiter, F. M. Phipps and maybe others whom we have no record of. Charter members of our church were: Floyd and Alcy Banks, Bill and Susan Banks, Serena Jones, Susan Long, Peggy Day, Elizabeth Banks, Loretta Adams, Katie Day, Millie Bush, John D. Ison, Alec Ison, Lee Ison, Arminta Ison, Samantha Ison, Gilbert Boggs and Malinda McDaniels.

Our church was received into the Eastern District Association October 2, 1913, with delegates J. F. Banks and Gilbert Boggs. The Hurricane Gap Church was also received into the Association on the same date.

When our church was organized, services were held in the Little Cowan school house, a few hundred feet from where our church now stands. Ground for the old school was given by James Banks, grandfather of Bernard Banks and several of our now living members. A sum of money was given to the school board entitling the church use of the building for as long as it was needed.

Brother Bernard had bought the property just below Aunt Rebecca Jones's home, and he gave the church 60 feet in the upper end of the bottom and the first part of our church was built here. Later we bought the ground where the blacktop is and built the annex on the church which was dedicated to the memory of Minnie Vae Banks.

God has been good to us these 81 years. Since our church was organized, all of

the first ministers and members during the first 15 years of our history have gone on to their reward. But we have been blessed with others who have brought us the same gospel, preached in its power and purity and have meant much to us in our church, our homes and community. Those we think of are Elders D. F. Gilley, J. R. Peters, A. N. Joyner, F. M. Phipps, E. A. Robinette, W. H. Burke, George Short, Pleas Jenkins, Logan Willis, Ben Hill, Hobart Hall, J. H. Sybert, Alex Willis, Bryan Moore, Frank Brown, C. E. Slagle, Hampton Osborne, Tom Carter, Bob Carter, Elmo Dodson, Clarence Johnson, Basil Freeman, Coy Lawson, Clifford Williams, J. D. Maggard and others. Now the younger ones are still bringing us the true gospel and holding on to that faith which was once delivered to the saints. We thank God, our brothers and sisters in Christ, and all who have helped in any way to make our church what it is today.

Our membership today is 121. We are thankful the same God who inspired our forefathers more than 80 years ago is still watching over and caring for His people and we believe if time should go another 80 years, there will still be some at the Little Cowan Primitive Baptist Church who still serve and worship our God of our creation in the same old-fashioned way.

God's wonderful spirit warmed the hearts of those gathered for the first day of the association. God's people greeted each other with wonderful smiles, handshakes and fellowship. There is no better sight than to see and be a part of God's people coming together to worship Him in truth and in spirit. The congregation assembled in the tent as Sister Glennis Little led them in singing some old songs of Zion. This world is filled with sorrow and woe, but those that are going that way and trusting the unseen hand can read their title clear. It won't be very long until we can behold his glorious face in that beautiful city He has prepared for His children. Sisters Patsy Hensley and Doris Burke blessed us with their songs of praise. His children are not afraid to bid this world goodbye, for we're going to sweet Beulah Land.

Elder John Henry Sybert welcomed the congregation and appointed the Committee on Religious Exercises. This committee includes: Paul Wallen (chairman), Morris Giles and Mike Peterson.

We were further blessed by singing from Sister June Kail, followed by Sister Cora L. Neeley. In this life we are shackled by many heavy burdens, but Jesus will carry our load if we will just take the road we know, the one He prepared for us at Calvary.

Elder Sybert read a note from the family of Elder Bob Vermillion thanking the association for all the help they gave them last year. Sister Naomi Thacker thanked the association in person for the help she received after the passing of her husband, Elder Fremon Thacker. It was a blessing to see her able to come to the association this year and hear her testimony.

Elder Sybert recalled when Elder Bernard Banks and several others gathered at the association held with Edwin Holbrook Memorial several years ago, and how we miss all those that have gone on to their reward. He also remembered Elders Fred Smith and George Gibson, two of our preaching brethren that have passed from our ranks since we last met. He asked the congregation to remember the following ministers in our prayers: Elders J.D. Maggard, Hobart Hall, Walter Drinnon, Johnny Sykes, Henry Wheeler, Arthur Hensley, Bryan Moore, Lloyd Scalf, Lucian Lane, Gordon Justice, Bazzle Manis, Bobby Williams, Richard Watts, Hasco Jenkins and Gale Derrick. We must also remember Sister Ora Arnott and the family of Otis Lawson, who passed away earlier in the week. Special requests were made for Sister Zula McCullough's

great-nephew who is undergoing surgery today and for Eddie Malone's mother-in-law who was just diagnosed with bone cancer. Many hands were uplifted to signify unspoken requests just before Elder Roger Trent led us to the throne of grace.

After prayer Elder Sybert led the congregation in singing the association's standard, "Brethren We Have Met Again." The singers from Little Cowan blessed our hearts with more wonderful songs. The Lord is truly in our midst while gathered here, but we look forward to that land of Beulah, blessed, blessed land of life.

Elder Woodrow Fields came forward to welcome everyone to Little Cowan. He thanked everyone for voting to send the association to Little Cowan and for coming, but most of all he thanked God for His presence. His wonderful Spirit will make us welcome.

Having been chosen to preach the introductory sermon, Elder Oscar Irvin came forward. He read from Acts 2:38-47 and Jude 1:3 using it as his text, "Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort *you* that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints." In the eyes of this world we are known as old time folks and somewhat unlearned, but we know the Lord, wherein lies our strength. Satan's followers have done everything humanly possible to discredit God's people, but anything that is of God can not be brought down and anything that is not of God will not stand. Elder Eckel Head (alternate) followed with an inspiring message. God's work is not in the hands of this world, but in the hands of His people. Therefore we must give all diligence throughout our lives, just like Jude did, for the faith that was delivered to the Saints. God's message is the same yesterday, today and forever more. Shouts of joy and praise for our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ came from all over the tent as these men preached and God so wonderfully blessed His people.

Adjourned for lunch.

Thursday afternoon, September 29, 1994

The host church served everyone a wonderful lunch and the congregation reassembled in the tent with singing led by Sister Patsy Hensley. We were blessed with songs from Elder Bobby Williams and his wife, Juanita, followed by Elder Darrell Ratliff. When that final call comes, God's children will be safe for He will be with us all the way. His amazing grace will allow us to go on rejoicing and spending our time serving Jesus for some glad day we will arise.

Elder Sybert thanked the host church for the bountiful lunch and mentioned some special prayer requests for: John and Jim Bowlin's mother, all the requests made this morning and most of all for the unsaved. God's children signified many unspoken requests with uplifted hands and Elder Allen Hensley led us to the throne of grace.

The Committee on Religious Exercises now reports.

Brother Ralph Baker, chairman of the committee on Church Letters, now reports 65 churches which they recommend accepting. It was motioned, seconded and voted to accept the recommendations of the committee and seat those delegates duly elected or appointed by their respective churches as the voting body of the association.

Elder Sybert called it to the attention of the association that two churches did not letter in this year due to lack of attendance. These churches have been with us for many years and it is truly sad to hear they are not among us for this reason. Silver's Chapel did not letter in last year for the same reason. Each of us needs to pray without ceasing that God's will be done in these churches.

The delegation was seated in order to transact the business.

It was motioned, seconded and voted for Elder John Arnott to serve as moderator pro-tem for the election of the association officials.

It was motioned and seconded for Brother Danny Lawson to serve as clerk and treasurer. It was then motioned and seconded for nominations to cease, therefore by acclamation Brother Danny will serve as clerk.

It was motioned, seconded and voted for Elder John Henry Sybert to serve as moderator.

Elder Sybert thanked the delegation for their confidence, prayers and support over the years and asked them to continue praying for him. The clerk also thanked the delegation for their confidence in him and assured them he would do his best. He also asked them to continue praying for him.

It was motioned, seconded and voted for the moderator to appoint any and all committees. The moderator then appointed the following committees:

Committee on Newly Constituted Churches: Ministers - Terry Sizemore (chairman), Bobby Brown, Eckel Head; Deacons - Eugene Wallen, Edgar Neeley; Laymen - Jack Osborne and Bobby Caudill.

Committee on Arrangements and/or Queries: Gale Derrick (chairman), Gordon Justice, Lowell Johnson, Darrell Ratliff, Glenn Cornett, Richard Seiber, Neal Drinnon and Roger Trent.

Committee on Finance: Jim Jarnigan (chairman), Earl Miles and Bobby Carter.

Committee on Obituaries: Hasco Jenkins (chairman), A. D. Howington and Tommy Meade.

It was decided at last year's association that the Virginia trustees should check on how the deed for Catron's Chapel was written. Brother Jess Atkins reported to the association as stated on the deed that it would be in full force so long as this place is used by the Primitive Baptist Church, but when it ceases to be used for religious purposes it shall revert back to the original owners of their estate. It was motioned and seconded to dismiss this matter as far as the association is concerned and it was motioned and seconded for the association clerk to send a letter to the clerk of Catron's Chapel informing them that their ordination papers are no longer valid and as such, any ministers ordained through our association are no longer legally ordained.

The delegation voted to approve both of these motions.

The moderator brought a thought before the delegation that the practice of inviting the sick to the altar and anointing them with oil that they might be healed was being practiced in some of our churches. He asked everyone to refer to the writings of James in this matter. After some discussion no further action was taken.

Adjourned until Friday morning, September 30, 1994.

Friday morning, September 30, 1994

God continued to bless His people as they gathered for the second day of the association. As the congregation assembled in the tent, Sister Zula McCullough led the congregation in several songs of Zion. Oh what love, matchless love God has for His children. We long for an uncloudy day where we'll meet on heaven's beautiful shore in the sweet by and by. He suffered for us so our soul could be redeemed and we can proclaim I'm saved, saved, saved!

Elder J. H. Sybert, the moderator of the association, welcomed everyone back and thanked the host church, committees and everyone for their cooperation and fellowship. After reminding the ministers to sign the minister's book, he requested prayer for Elder John Turner's brother, Jim and Elder John Bowlin's mother, the family of Otis Lawson, Sister Dexal Greer's sister, Sister Ora Roberts, Sister Ora Arnott, Elder David Jerrell, the men and women in service to our country, Elder Hasco Jenkins' grandson that is in Haiti, Elder Henry Wheeler's brother-in-law, all requests made in prior services and most of all the unsaved. Brother Billy Jack Johnson took our petitions to the Lord in a most humble prayer.

The delegation was called to order to transact the business. Let us always strive to keep the business secondary to the worship of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

It was motioned, seconded and voted to adopt the business proceedings of yesterday as read.

The clerk read the letter that was prepared to send to Catron's Chapel. It was motioned, seconded and voted to send the letter to the church as read.

The committee on arrangements and/or queries reported that none had been received.

Elder Sybert sung the old song "How Great Thou Art" and led the congregation in another song before the preaching service began.

Elder Roger VanHoose, having been chosen by the committee on religious exercises, came forward to take the first part of the service. He read Proverbs 15:32-33 and Luke 8:26-37. Sin abounds in this world on every hand, but Jesus takes care of His children. He will cast our sin from us, just as he cast the devils from Legion. When Jesus was done with Legion he didn't live among the tombs any more, because he had a right mind and went forth to do the will of God. In Christ we are free indeed. Elder Bobby Brown followed with another wonderful message from on high. We must get our minds centered on Jesus and off the things of this world. Without Him in our lives we don't have the right mind to handle all the things Satan will throw at us. If we

center our hearts on God, He will give us a sound mind and God's love will abound. These men preached so wonderfully to us and God richly blessed His people. Tears of joy, shouts of praise and adoration filled the tent as His people rejoiced. Thank God for His Amazing Grace.

Adjourned for lunch.

Friday afternoon, September 30, 1994

After another bountiful lunch served by the host church, the congregation came together with songs of Zion and wonderful testimonies praising God. Standing on the promises of God we can be a light for Jesus and continue on our journey on the grand old highway. Glory be to Him that died for us that we can all continue going that way. In that sweet hour of prayer we can thank Him for His free gift of salvation, for what He's done for us in the past and what He's going to do in the future. After the congregational singing we were further blessed with singing from the Riverside Quartet and the West View singers. When we kneel and call His name, everything is alright as we talk to the Lord. As we travel the Glory Road telling the story, each of His children can say "Jesus is Mine" for He is real in the hearts of His people. We have to put our feelings aside, for the Lord knows best and there is strength in the Lord.

The moderator announced several revivals that would be starting in the near future at various churches. These include:

Elder Sybert asked the congregation to remember all the prayer requests made earlier, Jamie Kinsler, Brother Arthur Browning's nephew's newborn twins, the unsaved and a host of unspoken requests signified by uplifted hands. Elder Jim Jarnigan led us to the throne of grace.

The delegation was seated in order to transact the business.

The Committee on Religious Exercises now reports.

Elder Terry Sizemore, Chairman of the Committee on Newly Constituted Churches, reports that two new churches have been organized and wish to letter into the association. One church located in Highland, Ohio is called Macedonia and the other is located in White Pine, Tennessee and is called New Life. After examining the letters from these churches, the committee recommended that both be received. The

chairman of the committee admonished any churches that extend an arm to help start a new church to not only help them get started, but to continue working with them and teaching them the ways of our association to help them grow stronger. It was motioned, seconded and voted to accept the recommendations of the committee and receive Macedonia and seat their delegates. The pastors and delegates came forward to receive the right hand of fellowship. It was motioned, seconded and voted to accept the recommendations of the committee and receive New Life and seat their delegates. The pastor and delegates came forward to receive the right hand of fellowship. The moderator welcomed both of these churches into the association and asked the congregation to pray for them. This makes a total of 67 churches at this time.

Elder Hasco Jenkins, Chairman of the Committee on Obituaries, reported that 56 had been received at this time. He also noted that several of the obituaries were long and would have to be shortened before being printed in the minutes. The clerk of the association later asked the people who want an obituary printed in the minutes to send it to him anytime throughout the year. This will save him time in preparing the minutes.

Elder Jim Jarnigan, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, reported \$5,055.00 in receipts for the year.

The moderator thanked the committees for their work and discharged them after their reports were given.

Elder Kenneth Mitchell was chosen to read the circular letter. Its message was that of encouragement to the Saints, a plea for continued unity, peace and love among God's people and a warning to our ministers that they might be used of God as shepherds in our churches with no pastor or whatever way He desires. It was motioned, seconded and voted to print it in the minutes as read.

The moderator appointed 3 of our preaching brethren to prepare the circular letter for 1995. They are Elders Clarence New, Carl Lawson and Roger VanHoose.

The moderator appointed the Committee on Church Letters for 1995. The committee includes: Delmer Wallen, Jr. (chairman), Hank Winegar, Steve Minton and Billy Jack Johnson (alternate).

It was motioned, seconded and voted to have all things which are standard printed in the minutes.

It was motioned, seconded and voted to allow the clerk \$700 in appreciation for his services.

The host church will continue to be responsible for the maintenance of the kitchen, with any needed repairs to be paid for by the association clerk. Elders Carl Lawson and Howard Sybert and Brothers Scott Mellons and Danny Lawson will oversee the association electrical and speaker systems.

At last year's association it was decided for the clerk to put together a book with the directions to all the churches in the association. The delegation was shown an example of the book and the associated costs for printing it. It was motioned, seconded and voted to order 250 copies of the book and send one to each church and each minister with copies available from the clerk to everyone else desiring one. This would be paid for with association funds. Due to depleted funds, the churches were encouraged to contribute more next year. It was also brought to the attention of the

delegation that the mobile kitchen would need new tires before it could be moved again. An offering was taken up while Sisters Lenore Stevens and Naomi Payne sang praises to the Lord. These women blessed our hearts with their songs as the congregation contributed \$904.75.

It was motioned, seconded and voted to allow the clerk to replenish the necessary forms to properly perform his duties.

During the singing and the receiving of the offering, it was brought to the clerk's attention that a donation of \$500 would be made toward the cost of printing the church directions book if the association would order a minimum of 1000. The original motion to order 250 copies was withdrawn and it was motioned, seconded and voted to order 1000 copies of the directions book. Copies of this book will be sent to each church and minister with other copies available from the clerk.

Sister Brenda Neeley came forward and testified of the great things God had done in her life. Her testimony encouraged us all and ensured us that with God we can do anything. Elder A. D. Howington also testified of the healing power of God in his life. He is the Great Physician and through Him all things are possible.

There were a total of 6 churches that asked for the association next year: Beech Grove, House's Chapel, Oak Grove, Peterson's Chapel, Richardson Chapel and Swan Creek. During the plea process, 4 churches withdrew, leaving the vote between Peterson's Chapel and Swan Creek. By a clear majority the delegation sent the association to Peterson's Chapel, where the Lord willing we will convene on Thursday morning (October 5) before the first Saturday in October, 1995. Introductory - Elder Oscar Irvin; Alternate - Elder Bobby Brown.

Adjourned until Saturday morning, October 1, 1994.

Saturday morning, October 1, 1994

God's spirit and beautiful weather blessed the memorial service and final business session. People gathered in the tent as Sister Zula McCullough led them in singing several songs. Elder John Arnott served as moderator pro-tem to fill in for Elder J. H. Sybert who was serving in a funeral. He welcomed everyone to today's services and reminded them that this was our memorial service just before calling the delegation to order. Prayer requests were made for Maybelle Wilson, Hillard Webb, several that were in attendance asked for the congregation to remember them in prayer, all the requests made in the earlier services and especially for the lost. Let us pray in earnest for those that don't know God in the free pardon of sin. Elder Ron Bledsoe led us to the throne of grace.

Elder Arnott recognized the presence of Elder Bryan Moore that was in attendance

today. He is one of our older ministers and it was a joy to see him able to be with us again.

Elder Oscar Irvin, pastor of the host church, came forward to thank the individuals, businesses and community in general for their help during the association. He thanked everyone for the help they rendered during the association, for their attendance and most of all for God's presence here at Little Cowan.

It was announced that Elder Bobby Brown would begin a revival on October 22 at Valley View and that Elder Bobby Williams would begin one on the same night at Roller's Chapel.

It was motioned, seconded and voted to adopt the business proceedings of yesterday as read.

The resolution of thanks, prepared by the clerk, was read. It was motioned, seconded and voted to print it in the minutes as read.

This day was dedicated as a memorial service to our friends and loved ones that have gone on to their reward since we last met. We miss these dear friends, but we also understand that they are much better off than we are, having already paid that debt we still owe. Let us all work diligently to continue the work they started that others may be saved and grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord. Elder Arnott read the names and church affiliation of these dear saints for which obituaries have been received. Elder Bobby Williams came forward to take the lead in the service. He read from Ecclesiastes 3:1-14 and used as his text verse 14: "I know that, whatsoever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it: and God doeth *it*, that *men* should fear before him." God does everything for a purpose and reason that we might fear Him. Here in this life we are sometimes given various titles which in God's eyes mean nothing, but one day soon we can read our title clear and enter in to our new home. Death has no power over God's people for we'll lay off this old coat and put on a new one. Elder Terry Sizemore followed with another wonderful message sent from God. The Lord plainly tells us that we are to put nothing with it and take nothing away from it, for when He sets something up it is right. Our faith must come from the only source, from the Lord of heaven. Let us diligently contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints. These men preached so wonderfully to us. God has once again blessed His people. Thanks be to Him for everything.

The congregation fellowshiped and shouted the praises of God as we left the tent. Many continued to sing, preach and praise God all over the grounds.

Sunday morning, October 2, 1994

The people gathered still rejoicing from the many blessings God had bestowed on them throughout this association. Jesus first loved us and spoke to us that we might be able to tell His story through perfect submission to achieve the peace and joy only He can give. God truly blessed the Little Cowan singers as their voices blended in harmony to proclaim how they love Jesus, the best friend we ever had.

Elder Oscar Irvin, pastor of the host church, welcomed everyone to the services. He introduced all the ministers in attendance and thanked everyone for coming. God's blessings on His people have been so evident throughout this association that a prayer from one of our departed saints keeps coming to mind. Brother Cal Asbury would always ask the Lord to give His people a blessing that couldn't be gained, saved nor denied. I believe with all my heart that the Lord has answered this prayer during this association. Elder Bobby Brown and his wife, Eileen blessed us with their songs as did Brother Walker Bales; Elder Eddie Malone and his wife, Wanda; Sister Glennis Little and her son Tony; and Brother Darrell Roberts. These brothers and sisters praised the Lord with their wonderful songs and it was evident that He was pleased by the way He blessed His people. We don't know what tomorrow holds but we know who holds tomorrow. When our way groweth drear, God will take our hand and lead us on. Even though heaven's sweetest rose was broken at Calvary, it bloomed again in three short days. Each of us can honestly say there's been a change in us since Jesus set us free and He's holding to our hand as we journey through this land. I thank you from the bottom of my heart and I pray that God will continue to bless each and every one of you in the months and years to come. I believe all those in attendance would agree that it has been a real pleasure to be part of such a wonderful people. We give God all the praise and glory for it all. May He watch over and care for you until we meet again.

CIRCULAR LETTER

To the delegates of the churches composing the 142nd annual session of the Eastern District Association of Primitive Baptists, convened with Little Cowan Church, September 30, 1994, and to all those who may hereafter read these words: Greetings from your fellow servants and brethren in Christ. May the riches of the love, grace and mercy of God our Father be unto you, and peace through His Son and our Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

We are humbled to have been selected to constitute this committee. The first Circular Letter to the churches of our association appeared in the minutes of 1882. It was called an Abstract of Faith or an outline of our faith and practice. Since that time, several hundred great trumpeters of the faith have written concerning our Articles of Faith, our rules and practices, the prevalent issues of their time, and have offered advice and issued warnings. Our desire, for our time, is that these words might encourage our people to "take unto you the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day" and to "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints."

There can be no denying that these are evil days. We live in a world which is opposed to our faith in God, especially as it is based on our belief in Jesus Christ. Many of us, from time to time, have looked at conditions in the world and expressed a belief that we are indeed living in the last days or as some say, "in the twilight of time."

It may be said with certainty that people of every generation have expressed this same belief. The early church looked for the Lord's return in their time. Even the Apostle Paul wrote of the last days as being in his time. In reality, the last days cover the entire period of time between the ascension of Christ and His return. However, according to the scriptures, as the time of the Lord's return draws nearer, mankind's true nature of corruptness and depravity will become widespread, and in our time, it is openly displayed for all to see.

In II Timothy 3:1-5, Paul wrote: "... in the last days perilous times shall come. For men shall be lovers of their own selves, covetous, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy, without natural affection, trucebreakers, false accusers, incontinent, fierce, despisers of those that are good, traitors, heady, highminded, lovers of pleasures more than lovers of God; having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof." Paul not only exposed man's sinful nature; he told us these types of people would be found in the church. He then added: "from such turn away." This means that they and their teachings are to be rejected and not simply ignored.

The world is filled today with those who call themselves Christian while denying the work of our Lord. In August of 1961, Redbook magazine published a survey of

students in the Protestant seminaries in our land which showed that 56% did not believe in the Virgin Birth; 71% did not believe in life after death; 54% did not believe in the bodily resurrection of Christ; and 98% did not believe in the return of Christ. We may easily assume that those same students are now the pastors of a great number of mainstream churches or have attained other positions which has allowed them to influence countless others with their false beliefs.

In Matthew 24, Jesus gave the signs for the time of His return in which He said, "many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many." Surely, many modern day prophets aptly fit His description. Just the mere mention of the names of two of these so-called prophets brings back the horrors of their deception. In our daily newspapers and on television, we continually see the other signs of which He spoke: wars, famines, pestilence and earthquakes. And yet Jesus said "all these are the beginning of sorrows." We have seen no troubles such as those which are yet to come, but we rest in the truth of His Word, "In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world."

If we have "put on the whole armor of God," we will not only "be able to withstand in the evil day," but we will also be prepared to "earnestly contend," "war a good warfare," and "fight the good fight of faith." The only weapon we need is the "sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." Many a soldier has been defeated because he chose to put on only part of the armor or took the wrong weapon into battle. Remember that Jesus used only the words of the scriptures to defeat Satan when He was tempted.

We have a great need that you who are the ministers of the gospel, and especially those who serve as pastors, provide us with strong, decisive leadership and guidance during these times. If you are weak, the flock will be weak. If you are bold, the flock will be bold. Paul gave great instructions to the young ministers, Timothy and Titus. He used action words to instruct them in the way - pray, read, meditate, study, be strong, hold fast, keep thyself pure. Mainstream Christianity mocks us because our ministers are not trained in a seminary, but we believe the Biblical way is the right way; that God calls and qualifies those whom He would have to preach the gospel, and those who have been instructed in this way shall be able to teach others also. So young ministers, let the elder ones instruct you as Paul did. Elder ministers, show no partiality to the younger, to the end that they too in the days to come might be able to pass on to others what they have learned of you.

To those whose names appear in our list of ministers but who are not pastoring, holding revivals, or preaching anywhere on a regular basis, may we use Paul's words to beseech you to "neglect not the gift that is in thee." In some, perhaps it has been neglected so long that there is a need to "stir up the gift of God, which is in thee." The gift of the ministry, which God has given, is of great value - but only if it is used.

Churches, remember that no two preachers are alike. The style and manner of speech of the man delivering the sermon does not matter, but the truth of the message and the spirit with which it is brought is all important. It does no good to "enjoy" the way a man preaches if the words which were spoken cannot be recalled and applied in our life. The man of God bringing the message of God deserves our undivided attention and our prayers.

May God truly bless us all.

PROCEDURE FOR ORGANIZING NEW CHURCHES

(Revised 1964)

1. Obtain an arm from the nearest sister church when practical. This arm must be chosen at a regular business session of the church and should consist of no less than seven members; three of whom should be ordained members.

2. When the arm arrives at the designated place, a moderator and clerk pro-tem shall be chosen after which the moderator shall call the council to order and have the clerk read the Articles of Faith, Church Covenant, Rules of Decorum and Church Constitution. These must be adopted and written in the church book.

3. The moderator shall ask for those who wish to become members of the church, and they shall be received in the manner approved by the Primitive Baptist Church. Should there be less than seven, they shall remain under the watchcare of the church from which the arm was obtained. This church shall be required to appoint such members as may be necessary to transact business. These members shall be required to be present at each regular church session until the new church becomes a body of at least seven members.

4. A pastor and clerk shall be elected at this time, and when practical, at least one member shall be chosen to prove himself for the office of deacon.

5. A name shall be given the church and their regular meeting time declared.

PROCEDURE FOR ORDINATION OF MINISTER OR DEACON

(Revised 1964, 1970, 1983, 1988)

Any person being considered by the church for the Ministry or the office of Deacon must be set apart by the church to prove himself as to his calling and qualifications for as long a time as the church may deem necessary.

In order to better acquaint both the presbytery and the local church pertaining to the qualifications of a minister and deacon, the past records have been thoroughly

searched. There may have been many ideas, opinions and much discussion; however, the records are the only official means we have of knowing where the association stands and the action it has taken.

(A) We believe the only power that can qualify a person to preach the gospel is the Spirit of God, and no educational institution can qualify a person to preach the gospel.

(Blackwater, Tennessee - 1881)

(B) We advise the churches to be careful in the ordination of ministers and deacons in order that they observe gospel order. (See Paul's instructions to Timothy and Titus.)

(Piney Grove Church - 1886)

(C) Is it right, according to the Scriptures, to ordain a man with two living wives or the wife having two living men?

Answer: No.

(Jenkins' Chapel Church - 1982)

(D) How shall ministers from other associations be received into the Eastern District Association?

Answer: Any minister of any other organization desiring to become a member of any of the association churches as a minister: (1) shall first be received as a member of a local church; (2) the church then at their discretion shall set him aside to prove himself; (3) when the church is fully satisfied, they shall proceed to ordain him according to our rules.

(Blackwater Lick Church - 1978)

When the church is satisfied concerning the candidate for ordination and have voiced their approval of him, then at an appointed time the ordination is to be carried on in the following manner:

1. A Legal Presbytery is appointed which shall consist of not less than three nor more than seven ordained men, one of whom should, if possible, be an ordained deacon in the church in which the ordination is taking place. In case only three are used to compose the Presbytery, two ministers and one deacon, or two deacons and one minister, may be used.

2. The church presents the candidate for ordination to the Presbytery for examination. Each member of the Presbytery will have ample opportunity to question the candidate concerning his calling if to the ministry, also concerning his moral and spiritual qualifications and particularly to his understanding and belief of the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum and other principles of the church.

3. When the Presbytery has completed their examination of the candidate, they return him to the care of the church with their report.

4. If the report of the Presbytery is satisfactory and the church is satisfied, they

express their approval and return the candidate to the hands of the Presbytery for the ordination.

5. The Presbytery with prayer and laying-on of hands ordain the candidate. A charge is given by one member of the Presbytery. A Certificate of Ordination may then be given with authorized signatures.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having been, as we trust, brought by the grace of God to embrace the Lord Jesus Christ, and to give ourselves wholly to him, we do solemnly and joyfully covenant with each other to walk together in Him in brotherly love to His glory as our common Lord. We do therefore, in His strength engage that we will exercise a mutual care as members one of another to promote the growth of the whole body in Christian knowledge, holiness, and comfort to the end that we may stand perfect and complete in all the will of God, and to promote and secure this object we will uphold the public worship of God, and the ordinances of His house, and hold constant communion with each other therein. That we will cheerfully contribute of our property for the support of the poor, and for the maintenance of a faithful ministry of the gospel among us, and that we will not omit family religion at home, nor allow ourselves the too common neglect of the great duty of training our children and those under our care with a view to the service of Christ and the enjoyment of heaven. That we will walk circumspectly in the world that we may win their soul; remembering that God has not given us the spirit of fear, but of a sound mind, that we are the light of the world, and the salt of the earth, and as a city set on a hill. That we will frequently exhort, and if occasion requires it, admonish one another according to Matthew 18; in the spirit of meekness considering ourselves, lest we also be tempted, and that as in baptism, we have been buried with Christ, and raised again, so there is on us a special obligation, thenceforth to walk in newness of life, and may the God of peace who brought again from the dead, our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, who through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make us perfect in every good work, to do His will working in us that which is well pleasing in His sight through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen.

CHURCH CONSTITUTION **(Especially for Newly Constituted Churches)**

We do, with mutual consent, agree to embody ourselves together as a religious body to worship God. Being a church congregated, we hold and teach:

Baptism of believers in Christ by a decent immersion of our whole bodies once in water;

The final perseverance of the saints;

The resurrection of our bodies;

A restricted communion to church members in full fellowship;

The Old and New Testament Scriptures (King James Version) to be the revealed will and mind of God;

The Christian Sabbath to be a holy and heavenly institution;

That we should not forsake the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is, and especially our regular church meetings should diligently be attended;

That we should not expose the infirmities of our members except in gospel order;

That we should not move out of the bounds of the church without applying for a letter of dismission;

And that we should communicate of our worldly substance for the decent support of the church and ministry.

With this mutual consent and understanding, having been duly and properly organized, constituted, and pronounced a church, we are ready, by the will of God, to proceed to business.

(Revised in 1959)

RULES OF DECORUM

Ordered, therefore that the following decorum be a rule for the church to conduct herself by in the future conferences. See Nehemiah 10:39.

1. Conference shall consist of members of the church and visiting members of sister churches of the same faith and order if so desired.

2. Conference shall be opened and closed with praise and prayer to Almighty God. I Tim. 2:1; I Thess. 5:17, 18.

3. One shall be chosen to preside, who shall be addressed under the appellation of "Brother Moderator," to whom every speech shall be perfectly directed.

4. The members' names being regularly enrolled shall by the Clerk be distinctly called over.

5. A door shall be open when thought necessary for admission of new members into the church. But none shall be admitted but by unanimous consent, and shall first verbally relate their experience and give an account of the work of God in their hearts; and secondly, of their faith and principles, if the church requires it; and thirdly, the church shall make diligent inquiry respecting their moral conduct. When full satisfaction shall be obtained, the Moderator shall manifest the same by giving the right hand of fellowship and thus receive them in order.

6. No complaint shall be brought in the Conference respecting crimes of a private nature until the grieved party has complied with the directions of our Lord in Matt. 18:15.

7. Every motion and second shall come under the consideration of the

Conference unless withdrawn by the member who made it.

8. Every query presented shall be three times read. When it is read, the Moderator shall put it to a vote to see if the majority is for or against answering it. The query shall be debated if deemed necessary, but the querist may withdraw it any time providing that no intricate question be asked.

9. If the minority at any time should be grieved at the determination of the majority, they are hereby directed to make the same known immediately to the church; and if satisfaction cannot be obtained, it may be necessary in that case to call for help from sister churches.

10. Section 1. All business of the Conference shall be recorded by the clerk before the conference rises; the same shall be distinctly read and corrected, if need be.

Section 2. Any member neglecting to attend conference, the same shall be disorder.

Section 3. Any member absenting himself or herself from conference without leave, the same is disorder.

Section 4. Any member whispering or laughing in time of public speech, the same is disorder.

Section 5. If two or more shall speak at one time, or any member speak without rising and addressing the Moderator, the same shall be disorder.

Section 6. Any member speaking more than three times on any subject without leave obtained, the same is disorder.

Section 7. Any member, grieved at anything done in conference, and shall hold his or her peace, and shall not let the same be known until conference rises and shall afterward speak of the same, as it manifestly tends to confusion, is hereby deemed disorder.

Section 8. Any member speaking or acting in wrath or anger, or in threatening or disregarding manner, as it shames religion, wounds the cause of Christ, and grieves the true Christian, is hereby deemed disorder.

Section 9. If any moderator shall neglect plainly and calmly to reprove any member transgressing these rules, or behaves in any manner irreverently in the time of conference, the same is disorderly in him, and himself, for the time, liable to be reprovod.

Section 10. The woman hath not the right by the law of Christ to usurp authority over the man, and therefore ought not to speak in church, only in case of conscience, or in such particular circumstances that the nature of the case may require it.

Section 11. Amendments to these rules may be made at any time when the conference shall deem necessary.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one true and living God as revealed in the Bible and the Holy Trinity by the name of The Father, Son and Holy Ghost. I John 5:7.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scripture, as recorded in the King James translation of 1611, to be the written and revealed Word of God. II Tim. 3:16; II Pet. 1:20, 21.

3. We believe God created the heaven and the earth and all things therein. Gen. 1:1; Col. 1:16, 17; Rev. 4:11.

4. We believe God made man of the dust of the earth, and He made him good and He gave him a law to keep and man transgressed the law and fell from his first estate and lost his righteousness. Gen. 1:27, 2:7, 2:16, 17, 3:6-23.

5. We believe in the total depravity of man, that he was unable to redeem himself from the fallen state he was in. Gen. 3:24; Rom. 5:9-19.

6. We believe God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son to be the propitiation for the sins of the world, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16; I John 2:2.

7. We believe sinners are justified by faith and saved by grace. Eph. 2:8; Rom. 5:1, 2.

8. We believe the Gospel is the only means God has ordained by which sinners are brought to Christ. I Cor. 1:21-24.

9. We believe he that believeth in the Son of God hath the witness in himself. I John 5:10.

10. We believe baptism, the Lord's Supper, and feet washing are ordinances of Jesus Christ given to the church by example and command for us to observe until He comes again. Matt. 28:19; John 13; I Cor. 11:23-26.

11. We believe the only scriptural mode of baptism is by immersion of the whole body in water in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, and believers are the only fit subjects for baptism. Rom. 6:4; Col. 2:12; Matt. 28:19.

12. We believe all the saints will persevere through grace and never fall away. Eph. 1:13, 14; I Pet. 1:5; John 10:28, 29.

13. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God and the sanctification of the Spirit through the belief of the truth. Eph. 1; I Pet. 1:2, 3.

14. We believe the church is the light of the world and is made manifest by keeping the commandments and examples of Jesus Christ, who is the Head of the church in all things. Matt. 5:14; Eph. 1:22, 23.

15. We believe God chooses, calls and qualifies those whom He would have to preach the gospel, and God has promised temporal support of His ministers. Rom. 10:14, 15; I Cor. 1:25-29; I Cor. 9:7-11.

16. We believe in a restricted communion confined to the church in fellowship,

walking in the light and observing gospel order. I Cor. 5:11, 12; John 13; I Cor. 11:31, 32.

17. We believe Christ is the only lawgiver in Zion, and the New Testament scripture is perfect, a thorough furnisher to the man of God unto all good works. James 4:12; II Tim. 3:16.

18. We believe Jesus Christ, during the time of His earthly ministry, set up a spiritual kingdom on earth, in fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy; He being the King and all born again believers the subjects of the Kingdom, and they are now reigning with Him as Kings and priests on the earth. Dan. 2:44; Isa. 9:6, 7; Matt. 3:2; Luke 17:20, 21; John 18:36; Rev. 1:5-7.

19. We believe God hath appointed a day in which He will judge the world in righteousness by His Son, Jesus Christ, and this day will be after the death of the body. Heb. 9:27; John 5:22; Acts 17:31.

20. We believe there will be a general resurrection at the last day, both of the just and the unjust; this will also be the day of final judgment and the eternal destiny of all people, of all ages, will then be made known. Acts 24:15; John 5:28, 29; I Cor. 15:23, 24, 54; I Thess. 4:14-17; II Thess. 1:7-10.

21. We believe the punishment of the wicked is everlasting and the joys of the righteous are eternal. Matt. 25:46.

ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

1. This Association shall be called "The Eastern District Association of Primitive Baptists."

2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and producing letters from their respective churches shall be entitled to seats.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed the number in fellowship and gains and losses since the last Association.

4. The members chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, neither any clerical power over churches, nor shall they infringe upon the material rights of any church in the union.

5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.

6. The Association shall have a moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

7. New churches may be admitted into the union by letter and delegates; and if found orthodox and orderly, shall be admitted into the Association and manifested by the moderator giving each the right hand of fellowship.

8. Each church shall be entitled to one and not more than four representatives in the Association.

9. Each query presented by any church to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall be taken up by the Association.

10. Each motion and second shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

11. The Association shall furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

12. We think it necessary to have an Association fund for defraying expenses, for the raising and supporting of which it shall be the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums as they may deem proper and send it by the hands of their delegates to the Association.

13. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be recorded by the clerk, who shall have a compensation for his trouble.

14. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the Association rises.

15. Amendments to this form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the union, if they deem it necessary.

16. The Association shall have power to provide; first, for a general union of the churches; second, to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the churches; third, to give the churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty.

17. The Association shall have power to inquire into the cause why churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

18. The Association shall have power to appropriate the money contributed by the churches to any purpose it may think proper.

19. The Association shall have power to appoint any member or members to transact any business it may deem necessary.

20. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church that violates the rules of the Association or deviates from the principles of orthodox religion.

21. The Association shall have power to admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat in the Association.

22. The Association shall have power to adjourn to meet at any future time or place it may deem proper.

23. Each church shall endeavor to have its letter and delegates present on the first day of the Association. Any church not represented at that time shall report to the committee on letters giving their reason for delay.

50 Years Ago - Fairview Church in St Charles, Virginia hosted the 92nd annual session in October, 1944. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. H. Sybert from I Corinthians 1:23-24. He was followed by Elder Frank Brown. Elder T. R. Carter was elected moderator and Elder Amos Osborne was elected clerk and treasurer. The association was made up of 65 existing churches and 3 new ones. This was the largest number of churches to letter into the association at that time.

25 Years Ago - In October, 1969 the 117th annual session convened with Roller's Chapel Church. Elder J. R. Peters came forward to preach the introductory sermon and quoted the 7th verse of the 34th Psalm and used this as his text. Elder E. W.
